

Backcountry Emergency Care

"Band Aid!" Once again we were fortunate to have John "Bugeye" and Lori "Ladybug" Papastathis lead us through a backcountry first aid class during the Memorial Day weekend. Bugeye and Ladybug have been associated with Pyles Camp for nearly ten years training almost all our counselors and specialists in the finer art of Backcountry Emergency Care. Due to the remote areas we venture into, we become 911 until any assistance arrives, which could be anywhere from an hour to a day away.



The specialized training is vital to the safety of everyone in the backcountry.

This three day, 22 hour, intense class, provides the staff with a mix of lectures and lots of hands on practice, involving almost every possible incident that may arise. Though intense, there never seems to be an end to Bugeye and Ladybug's patience in providing extra assistance on the more difficult situations.

This training has been a great asset. We are proud to say that many of the skills we have learned have yet to be used, except for one: the increased confidence each of the staff has in themselves to handle

difficult situations. Thank you Bugeye and Ladybug, you are defi-

nitely part of the Pyles Camp family. We look forward to many more years to come.

New Millenium - New Technology



The life that started it all

The boy was a mere eight years old when life dealt him a paralyzing body blow. Straight to the heart. The lad was deeply engulfed in family - his mother, brothers and sisters and especially his dad. Then suddenly, father was gone. Called by his Maker. Just when the lad was growing tall enough to share his life. Hunting coon and possum in the woods, fishing streams and clear-blue lakes, hiking in the hills, riding a sturdy palomino, all treasures his dad had stored for him were stolen away. The boy shed tears slowly and grew up fast.

The boy was Robert McDonald Pyles of Mansfield, Texas, the ninth in a family of ten children. After his father died a fire swept through

the family store, destroying their only means of livelihood. His mother headed for California with her children to the latest gold boom town called Ransburg in Kern County, setting up a grocery store to feed the miners. Bob barely finished sixth grade before work called him, he needed to help support the struggling family. At age twelve Bob was driving a mule team to Ballarat and other desert mining towns, the only drivers license needed was a pair of reins and a whip. Soon there was a different kind of boom, Black Gold or oil. At age 17 he went to work in the Bakersfield oil fields hoeing weeds, shoveling gravel, cleaning tanks and scouring boilers from the inside and digging ditches in the afternoon sun. When rotary drilling became the rage, he switched to roughnecking - climbing derricks and manhandling pipe from a monkey board. After a stint at Woodbury Business College in Los Angeles, he returned to Taft as one of the youngest rotary drillers in history.

Mr. Pyles was lured by the majesty of the Sierra Mountains. He would ride there at every opportunity challenging the slopes and roaring creeks. Just as he knew petroleum would be his vocation, he also believed that climbing mountains would forever be his passion. He loved the Sierras, their rugged contours, babbling brooks and perilous passes. Some day he would forge a dream from those mountains and change his life and the lives of others for generations to come. But many grades had to be ascended and streams forded before then.

Through his hard work, determination and creative skills, he became a success in the oil industry. Camping in the Sierras on the Kern River with some oil friends in 1947, Mr. Pyles separated from his group and meandered into a clearing where he tethered his horse, perched on a boulder, gazed at the star-saturated sky and decided it was time for a heart-to-heart talk with God. He was disturbed, for he had not

come close to fulfilling his dream. He was not a rich man, he needed help but didn't know where to start. Kids were his main concern, they always had been since he lost his father. He sensed the beckoning of the majestic redwoods and the brooks. They were telling him something and now he knew the real substance of his dream. This was the place, what lost kid couldn't find himself out here. If mothers and fathers were failing, surrogate dads and Mother Nature could get them back on the beam. Kids had to get out of the city to gain proper perspective, they needed a setting like this. He lifted his head and prayed toward heaven. He needed help; it was time to implement his dream of opening a camp!

"Sweetchuck's...Survivors" "Sweetchuck's...Survivors," I chanted with my group, still filled with great curiosity and excitement. As I first stepped into main camp, I thought: Wow! This is camp? It was like nothing I had had in mind. I took a deep breath and exhaled. I'm still alive! The air was actually fresh and the difference was obvious. The six hour bus ride and six-mile hike was all worth it because I was finally here, standing face to face with nature. I would definitely enjoy the next two weeks of my life.

Going to R.M. Pyles Boys Camp was the easiest decision I ever had to make. I love being in the mountains and there is nothing that I wouldn't give to be up there, so making my decision to go to Pyles Camp was very easy. When my sponsor, Mike Bayer, told me that I was going to be in the wilderness for five days, I said yes without any hesitation. Think of it: no electricity, no sirens, no gunshots, no pollution. The only thing I would hear would be nature's creations.

I had the greatest experience during my second year at Pyles Camp as a Lioneer. Almost two whole weeks in the wilderness; with only my three counselors and my group. In order to make it through these days, I had to trust and depend on them as they would do the same to me. These strangers became closer to me than some of the friends I've known for years. What more can this camp offer me? I became a worker and a member of the staff during my third year at Pyles Camp.

It was not until my sophomore year in high school I realized that I was taking a class which was related to what I've learned at camp, Peer Counseling. I've already learned the skills of leadership: good communication skills, responsibility, and respect. Then I learned the skills of being a good peer counselor: having good communication skills, being responsible, and showing

respect. Although these skills were taught differently, the outcome was the same.

The opportunity to go to Pyles Camp only comes once in a lifetime. I'm glad I didn't pass it by. Pyles Camp has everything; it is up to the each individual to take advantage of it. What one gets out of it depends on how much one is willing to work towards it. Not everyone will get this chance, but for those who do, don't let it slip by you.

The wish was granted. This music was the haunting melody we now know as "TAPS" used at military funerals.

Here are the words to "TAPS", which we sing at the end of each campfire.

From the lakes, from the hills, from the sky
All is well, safely rest
God is nigh.
