Pyles Leadership Training

Becoming a counselor at Pyles Camp is not guaranteed. It is earned! While at camp your experience and safety was dependent to a large degree on your counselor. We expect a lot from our counseling staff. Besides the rigorous main camp program and learning to turn eight strangers into a close-knit team, we entrust them with your safety during the five day outcamp trip into the wilderness. This is no small task! The PLT program prepares them for this challenge.

<u>Pyles Leadership Training (PLT)</u> is an intense two-week long training session that every staff member goes through prior to becoming a counselor. This year's PLT's were **Method**, **Bamm Bamm**, **Hollywood**, **Serpico**, **Thinker**, **Windbreaker**, **Chief**, **Gunther and Venom**.

This group of outstanding young men were chosen to participate in this special program based on their ability to work hard, enthusiasm for camp and the desire to work closely with you, the campers. Each PLT learns the importance of group responsibility, teamwork, supervision, decision-making skills and safety. In addition to learning counseling skills the PLT's tour the backcountry to become familiar with outcamp locations and to practice their outdoor living skills.

For about the last eight years **Stan** "Coach" Moe (Pyles Camp Board Member and Retired Kern County Sheriff Commander) has been our lead instructor. Due to the important role of a counselor, Coach requires a lot from each participant.














Lion Meadows

This past summer marked the 25^{th} year of the Lion Meadows Program and though the summer was cut short, the Lioneers were exceptional. Everyone was faced with unique challenges and fears. Though the trail may have been long and the packs heavy every Lioneer persevered. The Lioneers grew to care for one another, to trust each other and to be responsible for each other; in short we became a family for two weeks. As I look back on this past summer, the last two days of each session stand out for me as very special. 

Perhaps you will be a staff member one day and join us for these exciting opportunities to grow.






























3 Sessions Forced to Cancel Due to Forest Fire

On the afternoon of Sunday, July 21, things were going great. The Olympics were in full swing, the Lioneers had just returned to main camp and we were eagerly awaiting the Voyagers return. It was the last full day of third session with a great group of boys. The staff were looking forward to what would potentially be a really good last campfire.

Around 3 pm Maverick, who was working on cutting a dozer line around Camp Whitsett, radioed and informed us that there was a fire racing up the canyon and heading toward Johnsondale and Camp Whitsett. At that time we could see no sign of a fire from camp, but within thirty minutes the sky turned dark, the sun turned red and ashes began to float to the ground. We knew at that time we were going to have to evacuate fearing that the road would become closed.

Due to delays with the buses and speed of the fire we were forced to evacuate using every personal car in camp. By 5:30 pm with the help of the Tulare County Sheriffs we were able to evacuate about 140 people to the Ponderosa Lodge where we would meet the buses. On our way to the Ponderosa we were able to see huge 100-foot walls of fire rolling over the ridges.

With great forethought the campers shirts and awards were brought with us and presented to each of the boys while waiting for the buses to arrive.

Needless to say, what is normally a long day turned into a very long day. Many of the campers and staff did not get home until early the next morning. **Thank you's** are well deserved to all the <u>Staff</u> for helping out, <u>Selectors and Parents</u> for coming out in all hours of the night and morning to pick up the boys and finally to all the <u>3rd Session Campers</u>, <u>Lioneers and Voyagers</u> for hanging in there – helping us out – and understanding!

<u>To the 3rd session Campers, Lioneers & Voyagers:</u> All the staff feel sorry about the abrupt ending to your session. We were all really enjoying having each of you at camp. Please keep in contact with us this winter and try to attend the events in your area. We will be back in full swing next year and would like to see you back as Lioneers, Voyagers and Workers.



Camp after the Evacuation


Over the next month things were hectic with many trips up and down the mountain checking on the camp and hauling down supplies. The first trip was hauling the horses down to Kernville. While some were loading horses others were loading radio equipment, computers and other things of value into trucks and trailer. At that time the fire was still heading our direction.

A few days later things started to feel better when we got to camp and saw a dozen or more fire trucks and about 60-80 firefighters using camp as a firebase. My hat goes off to these men and women not only for the work they do, but for the respect they showed to us and the facilities while they were there, camp was kept very clean. It was only after some persuading that we convinced them we wanted them to eat the food in the walk-in. After they got over their reserve they all wanted to meet Nana and thank her for the great food.

As the fire began moving away from camp so did the firefighters. With the camp empty and quiet a local bear decided to move in. During his stay he got into Mr. Pyles cabin, trash cans, the messhall and the kitchen. In the kitchen he walked around on the counters and sinks, ate some of Nana's spices and tore up one of the freezers. The steel plates were put up on the kitchen and things stored away; with nothing left for him to get into he has moved on and has not been seen.

On August 29, 2002 it was announced that the fire was 100% contained. The fire burned more then 150,000 acres (apx. 243 square miles) at a cost of more then \$44.7 million so far. This fire will not be completely out until there is snow on the ground.

Camp, Lion Meadows and about 90% of our outcamp destinations are safe. We may have lost some of our outcamp destinations along the Kern River, but will not know for sure and to what extent until next year.



Mule Days

Will Rogers once said, "The best thing for the inside of a kid is the outside of a horse" (or mule, in this case). As we pulled out of the fair grounds in Bishop after the final competition of the 2002 Mule Days show, many of us were changed. The fear, uncertainty and self-consciousness that we felt when we arrived had turned into courage, faith and self-confidence by the time we left.

Pyles Camp was represented by another great team this year. Our Mule Days Director was **Reid Hopkins** and our Camp Leader was **Matt "Bodean" McDonald**. What Camp Means To Me

"Seeing challenges as a chance to grow"

My camp experience started in 1994, my camper year. I was a new immigrant to the country and didn't have very many acquaintances whom I could call 'friends'. I remember being invited to spend two weeks in a wilderness camp by my guidance counselor who thought a camp experience would help a teenager from a broken home assimilate to a 'foreign' culture. Although hesitant, I agreed to go.

As any first time camper, I was scared of not knowing what to expect. Yet, from the moment I reached camp I knew I had to take on numerous challenges. Climbing 'Jerky' was my biggest test as a camper, and to have a stranger (my counselor) try to push me was infuriating at first. Half way up, however, I decided to listen to his motivations and to accept his challenge, the camp's challenge. I set a goal to get to the top, and reaching it was the biggest accomplishment I had that summer—and, perhaps, of my life. *It was the first time I realized what I was capable of doing*. From then on I told

myself that nothing could keep me away from something I truly wanted. Overcoming 'Jerky' was only the beginning of the many trials I faced at camp. And as these challenges came, I took them and looked at them as opportunities for me to prove to myself that I could go further, climb higher.

During the following years, I had the chance to become a lioneer, a worker, a voyager, a specialist, and in 1998, the privilege of having my own group. Being a counselor to these campers gave me a chance to pass on the knowledge I had gained from my camp experience—be it having self-confidence, seeing challenges as a chance to grow, or taking ownership of my actions.

As I live in the city, I think about everything I learned each summer and apply it to my day-to-day life. Camp has taught me how to have trust in myself in everything I do. It created bonds of friendship and helped open doors. Now, as I finish my senior year at Berkeley, and as I apply to several graduate schools in Clinical Psychology, I look back to where I was several summers ago. My experience at camp made me a very different person now—someone who is always working towards a goal, someone who will not let opportunities pass by, and someone who will always have the time to give a part of me to others. 
Volunteers

To all those that volunteer and support the camp; **thank you!** We can't say it enough. It is with your help that the staff are able to work with the boys.




Can you hear me now?


