





New Riding Program

It was felt that a new, envigorated and educational approach to Pyles Camp horseback riding should be made in 1972. In line with this philosophy Smokey, the Camp Director, and Spike (his son and previous Camp counselor) took charge and mapped out the new plan. The first half of summer with the horses has been highly successful, beyond the fondest wishes of Smokey. Each camper not only was taught to ride the trails but became acquainted with, and in some cases proficient, saddling, bridling, grooming and maneuvering in the riding ring. The newly built riding ring was most important to this new program and the work-party who built it is to be complimented. This program will continue throughout the summer and the entire string of 11 horses and 3 mules will be used to their maximum.




ARCHERY




Thanks to the cooperation of the Calif. Dept. of Fish and Game we are being planted in our camp (Freeman Creek) every two weeks. Each plant is 800 catchable fish. This exceeds our previous plants by 25% and is an additional incentive for our young campers to catch their limit of Rainbow trout. The fish are transported from Kernville Fish Hatchery via mobile unit and put directly in our creek. We are indebted to the director of the Fish and Game Dept., Ray Arnett, for his continued support of our camp program. Mr. Arnett was previously a member of our Kern Co. Pyles Camp Committee.

Camp Inspections

The Pyles Camp has long been noted for its total cleanliness. Each morning every camper spends one hour doing his share to see that the total camp is spic and span. As a result of this effort, on behalf of the campers and counselors, Pyles is super clean.

In addition to the over-all cleanliness it is the philosophy of the camp to try to teach personal cleanliness in the campers. Each camper must pass inspection prior to each meal. A continuing cabin and bunk inspection is held throughout a camper's two weeks in camp. The cabin-winner of this inspection is given homemade ice cream, all the campers can eat, at the conclusion of 13 days in camp. Making of a bunk is very important due to the cold nights.

Dedication of Pyles Camp Grove

August 12, 1972 was the date for the dedication of the Pyles Camp Grove. The first tree dedicated was, naturally, that to Mr. R. M. Pyles, founder of the camp.

The Grove is situated within 100 feet of the center of the camp and will be all Redwoods. The first tree was a beautiful three foot Sequoia Gigantia and set within a surrounding area of stately Jeffrey Pines, all within view of the main camp.

The ceremony, dedicating the first tree, was attended by the Camp President Bud Reid and Vice President Ben Bayliss and Vice President Bill Collins. The campers, all 72 of them during that session, plus the 32 staff members marched into the Grove area and listened to a very impressive ceremony. Mr. Bayliss gave the history of the camp and its contribution to the youth of California, while appropriate words of dedication were given by Mr. Reid and Mr. Collins. Smokey McAdams told of Mr. Pyles deep feeling for this location for a camp and how proud he might be to have the Grove adjoining his campsite.

It is the plan of the Grove Committee, headed by Mr. Bayliss, to have future dedicated trees to those men and women in the Oil Industry who have given inestimable assistance to the R. M. Pyles Boys Camp.

The young dedicated trees will be watered and cared for during the growing season, the summer months, by specially chosen campers.
