

All camp supplies were moved to Huntington Beach for the winter to prevent theft . . . It worked. All equipment came back in excellent shape.






NEW CAMP HORSE



A desperately needed camp workshop and toolhouse was finished and furnished by Smokey this Spring. Now camp tools have a home.





Thirty-eight members, 98% ex-campers, comprise the Staff for the first six weeks of the summer session All are experienced and have come up through the camp organization of leadership training.








NEW FRIENDS OF THE CAMP





Phil Journeay and Wayde Benson of Orange find lots of excitement flying their gas model airplanes.




Eugene and Leon Fregeolle, Venice, build model war airplanes. They are in the process of building a battlefield and landing area for their collection.


Dennis Holmes, Venice, has received numerous trophies for his efforts in Little League baseball. Dennis also makes candles and raises tropical fish.

Aaron Duckworth, Bakersfield, is one of many of our campers who is making money as a paperboy. He delivers for Bakersfield News Bulletin.





COUNSELOR FINDS REWARDING JOB



In all there will be enough new things for interest and plenty old things that we know from experience work well. Should be a fun summer. Hope you show up.
